A Brief History

The creation of PYDS dates back to 1998, when Mr. G.K. Swamy noticed a gaping lacuna that existed in his rural community in terms of youth employability. Many were uneducated, some were supposed to have gone through schooling and some of the others had even college degrees. Their language, number, and social skills however were abysmal. They were unable to compete with their better schooled and privileged peers as their competence in terms of employability was seriously lacking.

From here germinated the sapling of PYDS. Mr. Swamy took the initiative to help and began an after-school tutoring program to supplement the education of four local children. The tutoring school initially operated out of his house and later used cattle sheds and garages for giving lessons. Shortly after the tutoring program began, several sponsors funded formal education of these children in a local English Medium Secondary School. The number of children seeking after-school help steadily swelled. The community children flocked to join the tutoring school. The criteria for taking on new students remained however unchanged: they should want to succeed and they had to come from the poorest backgrounds. In this way, a small gesture of free tutoring evolved into the idea of constructing a school. With the active support of pioneers such as the erstwhile Chairperson Mrs. Praveen Langham, Purkal Youth Development Society was registered in 2003 as an NGO. Situated in the Himalayan foothills it is dedicated to enhancing lives of underprivileged young people of the community. It empowers them with world class education and total care. It recognises quality education as the principal driver for community transformation.

Unfaltering in their dedication and tenacious in their goals, the Society and its friends raised the necessary funds to erect and establish a custom-built school building. Construction was completed and the school was ready for use in 2006. That year the teachers became full-time employees. In 2008, the Society took the first steps in setting up a separate primary school, secondary school, and a senior secondary school. The campus has steadily grown over time and now accommodates a fully equipped school with a dining hall, computers, science labs, libraries, sports grounds, yoga hall, an E-laboratory and an indoor auditorium.

There are many who helped this transformation. As a demonstration of our gratitude, we have dedicated trees on campus with their names inscribed. The names of many of our bigger donors are recorded on the 'Giving Tree' painted on our 'Donor wall' built in the School's main building.

Our strategy has always been to create opportunities and nurture children from very poor backgrounds. This is done through free quality education, mentorship, nutrition and complete healthcare. From just 4 students, the Society now has nearly 400 children under its wings. While midday nourishment has been available almost since inception, from July 2008 onwards we have provided four feeds a day – breakfast, fruit, lunch and an evening snack – for each of our students. In a landmark achievement, the school was granted CBSE affiliation up to Class 10th from 1st April 2011 and CBSE affiliation up to Class 12th effective from 1st April 2013. This certification also marked the end of our SPRY programme, through which the older students in our care were sent to a public school in the city. With CBSE certification, now all students up to Class 12 are full-time students at the PYDS Learning Academy and are able to avail all its facilities and benefits.

"To enhance the lives of underprivileged rural children through free holistic education, nutrition and healthcare"

PYDS is dedicated to enhance the lives of underprivileged young rural youth. We believe that education is the most powerful tool to bring about individual and community transformation. Education provided to students is designed to be diverse, enjoyable and meaningful, sensitive to the rural needs, and supplemented by nutrition and healthcare. We continue to nurture them through university education and are committed to providing requisite support till they are set on their rightful path to a successful future.

Our Vision

"Creating leaders for change: individual, social and global."

PYDS wishes for the emergence of leaders from amongst the poorest populations. We endeavor to provide underprivileged children with the wherewithal to realize their inner potential and empower them to pursue their dreams of a good life. These children are being groomed to be the future agents for community change. Our hope is for Purkal Youth Development Society to become the model for change upon which other schools in rural India may be established, and contribute to enhanced education of the underprivileged masses.

Our Philosophy

"One must be what one can be and in doing so realize ones potential and excel."

At PYDS we believe that everyone has the potential to succeed in life, regardless of social background. We wish to realize this for those at the bottom of the social ladder by providing mentorship, guidance, good healthcare and quality schooling. We shall identify children with academic potential from amongst the poorest to support in the attainment of a professional specialization.

The world is ever-changing and to equip students with only academic knowledge-memorized and regurgitated to score marks - will not help prepare them for the future. Preparing for the unknown means acquiring the knowledge, skillset and attitude that will enable them to evolve with the changing times. This approach embraces critical and creative thinking, personal development and self-sufficiency, conflict management, an understanding of ethics and values and consideration of global issues including sustainability.

We foster the development of the mind by encouraging and rewarding the process of curiosity, inquiry, and discovery within each child. Our scheme of education is based on providing children with diverse experiences and opportunities for inference and understanding. The Society has built the infrastructure necessary for meeting these goals. The anchorage that religion and faith provide will be cultivated, imparting at the same time a deep respect for faiths of all kinds. Capacitated with these varying forms of knowledge, learners will be able to develop the skills to lead a better quality of life.

PYDS teachers provide our deprived youngsters with a safe, supportive and

structured school environment. They work with the student's entire family in order to overcome the frequently complicated and challenging social situations faced by underprivileged families. Furthermore, our teachers participate in various workshops and teacher training programmes throughout the year to enhance the classroom environment. They go above and beyond the traditional 'call of duty' of educators.

We recognize that there is a great risk in embarking upon a venture of this nature without resources of our own. While inherent strength is gradually being acquired, support for the present comes through a host of individuals, corporations and foundations who continue to support our cause under the condition that the best is being delivered with a sense of mission and scrupulous honesty. Our tenacious and transparent efforts have allowed us to continue without fear of the shadows.

PYDS promotes education as a lifestyle rather than a prerequisite. We do not educate children as a sculptor chisels stone, but as a gardener who tends his flowers. Our holistic approach exposes students to a wide array of subjects both in and out of the classroom, including not only the traditional scholastic studies of mathematics and language, but also science, art, theatre, dance, music, sports, debate, health, community service, and spirituality. We encourage growth in all areas in order to identify skill development and ignite each individual's keenness to learn and thrive.

Education takes many forms at PYDS. Students enjoy field visits, friendly academic competitions throughout the region, lectures from international volunteers and professionals, community participation, clubs and more. Similarly, we encourage our teachers and staff to

further develop themselves through training workshops and lectures. Encouragement is a key element of our approach to education. We take great pride in our past and present student's success in all areas and celebrate achievements as a family. We hope the shared success will incentivize students and the community to reach high.

Education is not limited to the classroom. Through events such as Giving Week, where students join in various acts of charity including blood donation and tree planting - we are teaching our students to lead by example as active members of the community. Participation in international events such as Harmony Fest allows our students to engage with other cultures and learn for themselves the merits of collaboration.

We have achieved a multicultural balance at PYDS. While we prepare our students for the international climate of business practice by teaching them English and help them interact with a fair number of foreigners both face to face and through Skype, we simultaneously encourage them to celebrate their cultural heritage through traditional Indian art and music, Sanskrit lessons, prayer and festivals.


Providing healthcare for our students is essential, but it also teaches our children that education and health work together. Similarly, the inclusion of morning Yoga classes in the daily schedule demonstrates to our children that caring for both our minds and bodies is integral for success.

Since PYDS's inception in 1998, the mindset of education has evolved within the community. Most of the students under our care are the first-generation receiving quality education. Their parents initially yearned only for affordable education for their children without regard to quality. Many did not believe that education could change the future of their children. However, with time, education has provided dignity and hope to both the students and the community at large. Increased youth literacy in the village has become a catalyst for a hopeful and knowledge-hungry community. For example, when PYDS was established, the local tea-shop held the village's single newspaper copy. Today dozens of locals have newspaper subscriptions. Similarly, with PYDS's support, all new houses in the village are now being constructed with toilets and a washroom to increase hygiene and provide privacy. Faith in the ability of education to change lives has established a demand for quality schools and a climate of action towards this end is perceptible.

As Herbert Spencer once said, "The great

aim of education is not knowledge but action", and action is based on the ability to think intensively and critically. This skill is not something that is turned on and off; rather it is cultivated and blooms over time until it encompasses all aspects of life. PYDS is providing the platform from which our students can leap. We cannot predict the future our children will live in, but we can prepare them with the skills to manage the unknown. The combination of holistic education and encouragement that PYDS provides, helps students with the tools and confidence to challenge the status quo and create solutions to unforeseen challenges.

PYDS is sowing the seeds for a lifestyle of debate, analysis, consultation and lifebuilding for our students and community. We hope to elevate education to a limitless space and inspire self-sufficient thinkers who maintain curiosity, inquiry and discover through life.

Day Boarding



PYDS Learning Academy – Guiding underprivileged rural children towards excellence and a sterling future.

The Academy provides complete care and outstanding education for free to about 350 very poor children hailing from the neighbouring 41 villages. We are a CBSE approved Sr. Secondary School operational six days a week for 10 hours a day, 270 days a year, striving relentlessly towards creating a conducive, vibrant and progressive learning environment for our beneficiaries. In addition to holistic and contemporary education, all students are provided with free meals (breakfast, fruit, lunch, and snacks), healthcare, transportation, uniform and other supplementary support.

Partnership with educational path breakers such as iDiscoveri (XSEED), tGELF, AFS, IAYP etc. ensure overall world class academic exposure. Extracurricular activities and regular interschool interactions and exchanges keep the students and teachers in sync with current learning trends and educational tools.

This year, the Academy was a part of the Sahodaya competitions which were held in the field of sports, drama, dance,

singing etc. The emphasis that is placed on cocurriculars held us in good stead. The students performed well in all the competitions in spite of being new entrants.



Early Childhood Learning Centre



This facility has been a care center for 54 children this year (30 boys and 24 girls). Besides helping Stree Shakti mothers work without worrying about their young ones, the programme has been catering to the development of these children by providing a structured and stimulating environment for mental, physical, creative and social growth. The programme is also designed to instill values, a sense of cleanliness, and civic sense in our young ones.

The 10:00 am to 5:00 pm routine is aimed at keeping the children engaged and happy. They enjoy three feeds a day which include lunch, snacks, fruits and milk with biscuits. Inoculations and Medical Care throughout the year are aimed at ensuring good health. The 'Xseed' supported activity-based learning is aimed at building a creative approach to problem solving. Children enjoy an academic day which includes

sports, outdoor activities, and an afternoon nap to keep them alert and fresh. Their horizons are broadened with regular outdoor visits, picnics and field trips.

In the five years of its existence, ECLC has enjoyed the inputs of experts and volunteers across the globe who have helped make this a unique program for the tiny tots. We have incorporated a structured assessment record for each child to help understand their individual needs, growth and to further strengthen our process. In fact, one of our corporate supporters has established an ECLC in their project area copying the structure of our program. This is the best compliment we could have received and it surely is a reassurance and reinforcement for the credibility of our work.


Evaluating Students Performance

We had the second batch of Class 12 and the third batch of Class 10 from are Academy appearing for the board exams known as CBSE.


(Of the 19 students who appeared for the Class 10th Board, almost all of them scored well above the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) of 6. The top scorer for the School was Prachi Pundir with CGPA 8.2.

21 students appeared for the class 12th examinations. Shalini Pandey from the Commerce stream scored 91% while Aayushi Rana from the Science stream scored 70%. About 96% of our students scored 60% and above

On to Life - Post 12th Support

We offer support to our post 12th students to transit into life after PYDS. We recognize that competition for admission into good professional programmes calls for mentoring, encouragement and finances. We counsel each student and help them evaluate career alternatives and opportunities that suit their talents, interests and skills. These candidates have the advantage of our resources to prepare for competitions and complete applications.

Pursuing professional college education post school is also a challenge due to the rather high cost of such studies. The Society provides assistance by helping students access academic scholarships and interest-free loans. Furthermore, the Society has managed to identify individual sponsors to help fund the university education of several deserving students.

Our alumni are beautiful living examples of our vision of transformation. From humble beginnings of a poor rural backdrop, our young adults are now successfully pursuing professional programmes in the field of management, engineering, architecture, pharmacy, accounting, economics and more. Until date, 108 students have passed out of our scheme and we have been able to help 40

students pursue professional programmes. From the batch of a total of 21 students in Class 12th this year, Deepak Kumar and Rishabh Jain have secured admission into Dayal Bagh University, Agra. They are pursuing Diploma in mechanical and a Bachelor degree in Renewable Energy respectively. Another student from this batch, Master Shashank Joshi is pursuing his BCA from IMS while Sunil Joshi is pursuing Organic Agricultural Training at Bangalore.

Our present plans are to expand this post-12th support programme so that we may assist the increasing number of bright students who will be graduating in the coming years.

Environment Week

The tradition of celebrating the 50th Wedding Anniversary of Mr. G.K. Swamy, our Secretary, on the 13th May as Environment Day commenced this year. 100 trees were planted on both sides of the road leading to the school. The couple who have been associated with the Society since its inception thought of this as a fit way to thank Mother Earth for the support they have enjoyed throughout the years of their partnership.

The students and teachers contributed their labour for the planting as well as for the erecting of the bamboo fencing work. Hopefully these plants will grow and flourish along with the Society and its activities. A campaign related to the environment has now been launched and hopefully will be sustained over the years.

Giving Week

The 26^{th} September, the birthday of Secretary Mr. G.K. Swamy was being celebrated in different ways in the past; it focused on Mr. Swamy. To remove this unnecessary attention, last year we distributed fruit trees to all the students, which are now growing nicely in their houses. From this year onwards we shall celebrate it as 'Giving Day' and the week commencing 26^{th} to the 2^{nd} Oct as 'Giving Week'. Students are encouraged to embrace the spirit of giving with acts of self-denial and compassion. Each student pledged to do an act of compassion on the 26^{th} of September and they motivated their parents and community to do the same through the week.

A list of activities observed by the students during the week are as follows:

- Giving Service: Shramdaan: The entire school and our village were cleaned on the 2ndby groups of students headed by a teacher.
- Giving a Thought: Awareness Marathon:
 The entire school ran with decorated posters and messages painted on their T-shirts to promote thoughts on the various ways in which we can give to the environment.
- Giving Life: a Blood Donation Camp was organized on the 26thSeptember by the staff and students of PYDS-LA. A total of 37 blood units were collected.
- Giving Sustainability: A workshop was conducted by Dr. Bhupinder Singh, Urja Purush of Uttrakhand, on how to use Solar Energy and other non- conventional sources to save electricity. The attempt is to build energy self-sustaining households. We planted a Harmony Tree to remind people of sustainable

- development.
- **Giving a helping hand**: Students fundraised for J&K Flood victims. They were able to raise and contribute a total of Rs. 41,000/-in one week.
- Giving Love: Children brainstormed acts of compassion and completed them through the week along with their parents.



Involvement with Community



Community development at large has been our goal since the inception of PYDS. Generating employment for locals and increasing advocacy for environment, sanitation, social welfare and health issues are ways in which we aim to impact the local community. A critical element of this endeavor has been the active involvement of our students in various community campaigns. It is essential for children to be sensitive to issues within their own community. We encourage these future leaders to take matters into their own hands and work collectively towards a better tomorrow.

One of this year's student-run campaigns involved alleviating the problem of waste management, a challenge our community has been battling for a long time. The municipal authorities do not

address this problem adequately and thus our students ambitiously committed to attack the fundamentals. In July, PYDS launched a campaign in collaboration with another NGO known as Waste Warriors. Ms. Jodie Underhill, head of Waste Warrior Foundation, was kind enough to design a project for ending the menace of litter and plastic and arranging for their proper disposal. As per the programme, garbage is now collected from door to door after it has been segregated into recyclables and non-recyclables. The biodegradables are left to decompose in pits and a vehicle removes the segregated waste from the villages. We have commenced with three villages and are spreading the campaign. Two of our students brought this project to the India-wide Youth Leader 2013-2014 competition and won the runner-up prize.

Competitions and Events

- 42 of our students participated in the Terry Fox Run conducted by The Doon School. This run is about bone cancer treatment.
- 40 of our students attended in April a Manipur Dance performance organized by Spic Macay.
- Students participated in the Rajeev Khanna memorial Interschool guiz at Scholars Home.
- The Pushkin Chandra Memorial Inter Class Hindi and English Story Narration and Recitation Competitions were conducted at the school on 28th July.
- A Sanskrit week was conducted by Sankrit Bharati of Dehradun. Rangoli, Arts & Crafts, Dance, and Song competitions were held. Our students did well. 4 students won first prize in the Rangoli and Art competition; 9 children won runner-up for their participation in the Sanskrit group song competition and 7 of them won first prize for their performance in the Sanskrit Dance.
- 8 primary children participated in a poem recitation competition held at the Doon Girls School and won certificates and prizes for appreciation.
- Three Groups of 5 students each participated in the Geeta Shloka Competition at the Chinmaya Mission and recited shlokas for a period of five minutes.
- A National Essay Competition was conducted by the Central Board of Secondary Education on the occasion of Gurutsav on 2nd September 2014. 10 of our students from different classes participated. Muskan Godiyal of Class 8 won the 1st position in the category from Uttarakhand, and was awarded with a cash prize of Rs. 5,000/- along with a voucher of Rs. 1,000/-
- In October, PYDS participated in the "CBSE Expressions" series on the occasion of

Gandhiji's Birthday on a weeklong basis. Schools from all over India participated and four of our children bagged the first prize from Uttrakhand in their respective category. Each of them won Rs. 2,500/- as cash prize.

- Two of our students participated in the Quest 2014 quiz competition. This was held at the Indian Public School in October. Our students won the second prize among the 25 schools who participated from all over Uttrakhand.
- Two of our Class 7 students, Shubhagini Kumari and Akash Pal, participated in an art competition organized by the THDC. Out of 2.5 Lacs entries all over the country, the paintings by our students were selected to be among the top 50 entries. Each student received a cash prize of Rs. 1500/-
- Vikas Pal of Class 8 participated in a painting competition organized by the Water Board of Uttrakhand. His painting got selected as being among the top 10 entries out of 18,500 entries from all over the country. He received a cash prize of Rs. 3200/-.
- 90 of our students were selected for the level 2 of Cyber Olympiad. 5 of them earned special recognition. We are very proud of Kashish Aswal (Class 4) who secured the 22nd International Rank in her group.
- 8 of our students participated in a District-Level Dance and Music competition wherein our group secured the first place in Dance, and second place in Music. These students then advanced to the State-Level, where they won the third place.
- Two of our students participated in a Geeta chanting competition at Ram Thirth Mission and another similar competition at Kasiga School. The participation of our students was recognized in both these competitions.

Harmony Fest 2014



This October we participated in Harmony Fest 2014. Harmony is a school-level event launched by tGELF in 2009. This brings together students from India and overseas for a series of competitions and workshops with the objective of searching for social, action-oriented leadership talent. The students participated in a series of competitions and the finalists represented the school in the final round at Delhi. The events in which we participated were as follows:

Youth Leader 2013-14: Two of our students participated in the competition and worked on a project called 'Waste Management' (Elaborated earlier in another section). Our students were the runner-up in this India-wide competition and won a cash prize.

Reel to Real: In this competition the young students were asked

to prepare a movie on a prescribed theme. Our students created a movie called 'Glimpse of Happiness' dwelling on the Disaster Relief initiative undertaken by our Society.

Street Blenders: Our students prepared a play called "Hume Jawab Do". The school received a special recognition and was nominated as runner-up in the Regional Round.



Campus Activities

- The Global Leadership and Education Foundation organized a student orientation programme for Classes 10 & 11 on our Campus as part of the Leadership Programme for the current year.
- Our 4th Annual Day Celebration was held on the 28th of April 2014. with the District Magistrate Dr. BVRC Purushottam as Chief Guest. The Trust that our Society has been able to engender was heartwarming as he offered any big help that we may need. The highlight was a Sanskrit Dance Drama 'Nal Damyanti'.
- In May, we held the Budh Purnima celebration at our campus. A monk explained the importance of Budh Purnima and blessed them.
- Col. Arun Mamgain and Mr. Saurav Roy visited the campus and distributed certificates of appreciation to several of our students to recognise their voluntary work for the Tata Relief Committee.
- The school basketball and volleyball teams participated in the interschool basketball and volleyball competition at Parade Ground. They qualified for the semifinals in both the events.
- In July, a group of 5 students and one teacher submitted an entry for the 'Design for Change' competition. It focused on using Parthenium Hystrophorous (an invasive weed also known as Congress Grass) to create handmade paper. This weed is a menace and needs to be eliminated from our land. For inspiration, our children visited the Forest Research Institute (FRI) hand paper making unit and another unit at the NIVH. By October the students had successfully made 5 sample pieces of paper.
- The pottery club worked for months to make a wide range of masks. We now have a traditional coal fired kiln to bake these pieces and a gas fired kiln to later glaze and finish them.
- Teachers Day was celebrated on the 5thSeptember 2014. During the event

- anecdotal notes were written to several teachers, appreciating their kind acts. Appreciation windows were created in the staff room for use by teachers.
- Deepawali was celebrated in the campus on the 22nd October. An Inter-House Rangoli competition was organized and Shlokas chanted to celebrate this festival of lights. This was an environment-friendly Deepawali where students lit candles and Diyas.
- Sports day was celebrated over 2 days.
 Finals of different inter-house competitions were conducted. Medals and trophies were distributed to the best houses and the winners.
- On the 1st October an Awareness Marathon was conducted focusing on cleanliness, as stated elsewhere. Further, two movies were screened on this day, "I am Kalam" and "The Making of Mahatma."
- The International Benchmark Test, ACER (Australian Council for Educational Research) was held for students of Classes 3 to 10 on 21st November 2014. This was an opportunity to benchmark our students against other schools internationally.
- Christmas day was celebrated at our campus on the 24th December. Apart from a pot luck lunch during the day, the Amen Brothers Band performed Christmas carols in the evening. We thank Vishal Thapa for organizing the event. Many children also attended church and participated in mass.
- A Thomas Cook quiz competition was organized at our School for classes 6 to 9 based on places of interest in the world. There was wide interest in this exercise.
- Republic day was celebrated at the school on 26th January 2013. A March Past preceded the patriotic songs, PT & aerobics display. Both the Secretary and the Principal of the School talked about the many facets that constitute service to the Nation.




Nutrition



Similar to the previous years, this year as well, we provided all our students with complete nutrition through four feeds a day (Breakfast, a fruit, lunch and evening snack). The ECLC students under our care also received similar care which included a glass of milk every day. We provided following feeds during the year Breakfast 71,820, Fruits 86,400, Lunch 86,400/-, Evening Snack 86,400 and Milk 14,580.



Healthcare

We extend complete health care to all our beneficiaries. Our endeavor has been to help children focus on self-development without any fear of resources. Seasonal fevers, ailments, unforeseen health conditions and even surgical procedures are taken care of. A well-equipped medical room, a full time nurse, maintenance of a health record for each student, specialist consultation and hospitalization whenever required ensure that all students maintain good health.





Field Visits

- 40 of our students visited the Ordinance factory at Raipur to see an exhibition about Laser Weapons. This exhibition is open only twice a year on designated days.
- 20 of our students from Class 8 attended a Sanskrit workshop at Govardhan Sarawati Vidhya Mandir Inter College, Dharampur for a period of 10 days. The workshop promoted awareness of Sanskrit language, fundamental Sanskrit Speaking and included Group Activities and plays.
- 10 of our girls from Class 10, 11 & 12 went for an adventure course at Nehru Institute of Mountaineering, Uttarkashi. They participated in artificial rock climbing, Trekking and Cross Country activities. The following students performed well and were awarded prizes during the adventure course:

Best Speech: Shiksha Pundir, First Prize Cross Country: Priyanka Juyal, Second Prize

Cross Country: Akansha Pundir, Third Prize Rock Climbing: Manisha Thakur, Second Prize

Obstacles: Priyanka Juyal, Third Prize

- 4 of our students and 2 teachers attended a Model United Nation Conference at Delhi conducted by Georgetown University, Qutar.
- Four of our students along with our Mathematics teacher Mr. Ravi Bisht attended a Solar Project workshop conducted at RIET, Abohar in Punjab by Dr. Bhupinder Singh. We are grateful to Dr. Bhupinder Singh who runs the Institute and to Mr. Manpreet Singh who funded the effort The students learnt about incorporating solar energy at the campus and maintaining solar equipment.

- 10 of our students were invited to chant the Budha Shlokas in Sanskrit (called Pragyastrotram) at the inauguration by Tarab Ling Association in Maldevta.
- A Group of 33 students and 4 teachers spent 8 days in New Delhi. They witnessed the Republic Day Parade, the P.M.'s NCC Parade and The Beating of The Retreat. They also visited historical monuments and the Hindon Air Force Station (Hindon AFS). We wish to extend our special thanks to Mr. Praveen Gurnani, a very close friend of the Society who took complete care of the logistic and boarding facility for the group.
- Mr. Manish Chandel and 6 students participated in a "Go Green Cycle Rally". The purpose of this rally, conducted by the Rajpur Community Initiative Society, was to build awareness around protecting and preserving our natural environment.
- PYDS participated in the "Routes to Roots" programme, which enabled our students to engage in long-term communication with students of Pakistan through the exchange of letters, greeting cards & collages. After 8 months of communication with the Pakistani students, two of our students were selected for a trip to Pakistan on the 15th January 2015.
- 11 of our students participated in a Sanskrit workshop held at Sanskrit Vidya Mandir at Roorkee for 7 days. During the workshop they acquired speaking skills in Sanskrit.
- Throughout the year, many students participated in various intra-city excursions, including RIMC, IMA, Forestry Research Institute (FRI), UREDA Energy Park, Budha Temple, Sai Temple, Deer Park, and a nature walk alongside the Tons River.

Mentoring through Lectures and Workshops



- We had the privilege of having a Bharatnatyam performance at our campus by Ragini Chandrasekhar, regarded as one of the finest Bharatnatyam dancers of the younger generation and also known as an accomplished classical singer. This was courtesy Spic Macay foundation.
- 20 girls who are a part of our Stree Shakti programme underwent a 7 month English speaking
 course and received certificates for spoken English. At the valedictory event they staged two
 English plays as part of their learning. All these 20 women, some of them illiterate, can now
 handle their Stree Shakti customers in English. PYDS is proud to have been able to complete this
 exercise.
- 10 of our students attended an Art workshop conducted by Mr. Ruchin Soni, an artist from Delhi. Students in attendance are aspiring to join Arts and Design Colleges in the future. All of them have cultivated their skills and are preparing a portfolio.
- Students enjoyed a Karnatik music recital by Sudha Raghuraman, courtesy Spic Makay. Sudha ji is is a trained Carnatic vocalist equipped with strong 'Swaragnanam' and a recipient of the Ustad Bismillah Khan Award for dance music from Sangeet Natak Academy.
- Professor Ashok K Ganguly, Director of the Institute of Nano Science and Technology of Mohali, delivered a talk on Nano Technology on the 27th October 2014, sparking much interest in students. This talk was given on the occasion of the 80th birthday of Bharat Ratna, Professor CNR Rao, who was a predecessor of the speaker at the Institute.
- Maestros Ritesh-Rajnish Mishra, students of the famed Rajan and Sajan Mishra, performed a Hindustani vocal concert on our campus on 19th of November, courtesy Spic Macay.
- Senior Scientist Dr. Peter Burns from Canada conducted a talk on biotechnology, cancer and other medical research activities.
- We held a campus celebration of Guruparv on the 2nd December. Shri Guru Granth Sahib ji was brought to our campus and all participated in a Kirtan. Langar was prepared by the teachers and students and shared by all along with the ladies of PSSS.

Challenges Faced

- Recruiting enough children for the incoming Class 11 as we do not have 50 children in Class 10.
- Finding avenues for children of Class 10 who do not wish to pursue a general degree program post-10, but do want a skill-related qualification.
- Recruiting quality faculty, particularly for the Senior Secondary School.
- Improving the performance of students found in the lower-half of their class in terms of performance.
- Helping good students perform in an outstanding manner by providing them with further opportunities for study and work, post-school hours.
- Reorganizing school management so that there is a flat hierarchy instead of a pyramid.
- Sensitizing the community to problems of solid waste, health and hygiene, particularly in the context of open defecation.
- Financial sustainability of our Mission.

Challenges Met

- Three additional classrooms have been built to accommodate our growing student body.
- New e-learning laboratory now provides opportunities for children to access the net and work on projects. This e-lab equipment was kindly provided by Merchant Taylor School London and has created a wonderful opportunity for our students for self improvement.
- A well-designed and spacious auditorium capable of seating about 400 people has been constructed. The stage is equipped with a green room, quality lighting, and an adequate sound system.
- Construction of a hostel for 50 female students of the academic year 2016-2017 is currently in progress.
- Inspired by the example of PYDS, the company Fedders Lloyd, has commenced two schools located at Bhiwadi, Haryana and Jabbalpore, Madhya Pradesh. These are first steps taken in their plan to establish 13 schools in India, based on the PYDS model. We are working together to reach this goal.


Future Plans

- To find enough students to fill our Class 11. (25 each in commerce and science streams.)
- While we shall recruit the needed children for Class 11 from poor families, we need to house them in our hostels so that they have the time and space required for intensive preparation for their Board Examinations.
- For this purpose, we are completing a building on our campus which will serve as a hostel for 50 girls studying in Class 11 during the year 2016-2017.
- We still need to acquire a piece of land on which we can accommodate even more hostels so that an additional batch of Class 11 consisting of boys and girls can be admitted into the school in the year 2017-2018.
- We need to find support for 3 new sections that we are proposing to add to our school in the coming year in Classes 6, 9, and 11.


Controls and Checks

- A comprehensive Child Protection Policy and Sexual Harassment Policy is in place to deter violations of such nature and ensure the sanctity/dignity of individuals and the organization.
- Periodic meetings and reviews of the Purchase/Asset Management Committee ensure quality and maximum value out of the goods purchased.
- Comprehensive progress of each child is evaluated and reviewed by the principal on a quarterly basis. Each individual report includes the emotional, physical, scholastic and coscholastic areas, complete with input from all the teachers in different subjects and activities.
- Health history records are maintained for each of the students in books intended for the purpose. These comprehensive records cover vaccinations and other health-related concerns for each student to ensure proper healthcare.
- Suggestion Register to monitor the quality of food being provided.
- Four board meetings every year to assess the progress and discuss the future road map.
- During each quarterly Board Meeting, we present our internal audit, external audit and Board Utilization Certificates for review by the Board.
- Quarterly Budget Utilization is provided to the major donors detailing the expenses incurred against their contributions.


- Mr. Harshit and his team from TVAM conducted a workshop on value education for the staff
