Workshop for Teachers

To teach, one must learn. A workshop on 'Basic Human Needs & Learning' was conducted for the teachers by our Principal, Mrs Arati Nagaraj and Psychology teacher, Dr Roma Saklani. The main idea of the workshop was to integrate Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs with Bloom's Taxonomy.

Teachers were encouraged to be mindful of students' basic needs of safety and belonging, before turning to academic tasks. They were given tools to blend Bloom's theory of learning progress of students while preparing lesson plans for the upcoming academic year. Group activities were conducted during which teachers applied learnings gleaned from the workshop.



It was a proud moment for us when two of our alumni; who now work with the Society, Sunil Joshi (Batch 2015-16), and Ashwani Sharma (Batch 2021-22) inaugurated our newly built Storeroom. Sunil Joshi has been working with us for the last seven years and Ashwani Sharma joined us last year.

The old storeroom, at best a makeshift arrangement, was inadequate for maintaining an inventory of electrical, plumbing, carpentry, paint, stationary, cleaning supplies etc. for the entire school.
